## **APRIL MEETING**

April 20, 2021

Chair Brewer called the meeting to order. Roll call found all members present except Williamson, Couey and McGuire.

The Invocation was given by Monsignor Scheckel, Lead Pastor at Saint Mary Catholic Church, Richland Center. Vice Chair Turk led the Pledge of Allegiance.

The agenda was read by Vice Chair Turk. Motion by McKee, second by Seep that the agenda be approved. Motion carried.

Motion by Cosgrove, second by Manning that the March 16<sup>th</sup> minutes be approved. Motion carried.

Troy Maggied, Executive Director of the Southwestern Wisconsin Regional Planning Commission, presented the Strategic Planning Report.

County Administrator Clinton Langreck reviewed the proposed County Airport Improvement Project. The project includes raising the runway and taxiway; improvements to lighting and improvements to the drainage ditch to Bear Creek; and moving the existing irrigation equipment to improve the drainage ditch. This project supports airport operations by reducing closures due to reoccurring flooding and this project is seen as an economic development/sustainment by the Richland County Commission members. There is grant funding availability from the Federal Aviation Administration in 2022. This is a 9.5-million-dollar project in which the FAA would cover 90%, WI DOT would cover 5% and a 5% local share with Sauk County and possible local area partner support. Sauk County's estimated cost of the project is \$434,625.00 and Richland County's estimated cost of the project is \$144,875.00.

  - (c) The land to be rezoned is suitable for development and development will not cause unreasonable water or air pollution, soil erosion or adverse effects on rare or irreplaceable natural areas.
  - (d) Non-farm development will be directed to non-agricultural soils or less productive soils.
  - (e) Non-farm development will be directed to areas where it will cause minimum disruption of established farm operations or damage to environmentally sensitive areas.
  - (f) Non-farm development will be encouraged to locate so as to leave a maximum amount of farmland in farmable size parcels.
  - (g) Non-farm residential development will be directed to existing platted subdivisions and sanitary districts.

That the following described 5.88 acre parcel belonging to Sira Corp and in the Town of Akan is hereby rezoned from the General Agricultural and Forestry District (A-F) to the Agriculture and Residential (A-R) District:

Part of the Southeast quarter of the Northeast quarter of Section 2, Township 10 North, Range 2 West, Town of Akan, Richland County, Wisconsin more particularly described as follows:

# Commencing at the Northeast corner of said section 2;

Thence South 00°25'47" West, along the East line of the fractional Northeast quarter of the Northeast quarter, 1387.80 feet to the Northeast corner of the Southeast quarter of the Northeast quarter;

### **RESOLUTION NO. 21 - 57**

A Resolution Reducing the County Clerk Salary for the 2025-28 Term.

WHEREAS the County Board passed Resolution 20-44 in March of 2020 adopting the following salaries for the 2021-24 term:

# County Clerk

- 1. \$78,952.62 for 2021, that being a 2.5% increase over the 2020 salary of \$77,026.95;
- 2. \$80,926.44 for 2022, that being a 2.5% increase over the 2021 salary of \$78,952.62;
- 3. \$82,126.44 for 2023, that being a \$1,200 increase over the 2022 salary;
- 4. \$83,326.44 for 2024, that being a \$1,200 increase over the 2023 salary.

## County Treasurer and Register of Deeds

- 1. \$63,885.80 for 2021, that being a 2.5% increase over the 2020 salary of \$62,327.61;
- 2. \$65,482.95 for 2022, that being a 2.5% increase over the 2021 salary of \$63,885.80;
- 3. \$66,682.95 for 2023, that being a \$1,200 increase over the 2022 salary;
- 4. \$67,882.95 for 2024, that being a \$1,200 increase over the 2023 salary.

WHEREAS Wisconsin Statute 59.22 does not allow increases or decreases in salary for elective offices during a term but allows changes in later terms, and

WHEREAS a review of County Clerk salaries in 13 similar counties (with a population of 15,000 to 24,000 and/or neighbors) found that the average County Clerk salary for 2021 is \$64,246, with a range of \$54,621 - \$73,502, and

WHEREAS the decrease is appropriate because the County Clerk no longer carries out duties of the Administrative Coordinator, and

WHEREAS the additional ~\$15,000 in annual County Clerk salary for the remainder of the 2021-24 term may be allocated toward non-statutory duties and to fulfill certain strategic plan and administrative priorities adopted through Resolution 20-107,

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED when elected official salaries are set for the 2025-28 term, the salary of the County Clerk shall be reduced to equal the salary of the Register of Deeds and Treasurer, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED this reduction should not be interpreted as a reflection of the performance of the person holding the office of County Clerk, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that a memorandum of understanding be developed between the Administrator and incoming Clerk to detail the extra duties assigned to the Clerk for the remainder of the 2021-24 term, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this memorandum of understanding be approved by the County Board with first review by the Finance & Personnel Committee, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that this resolution shall be effective immediately upon its passage and publication.

A Resolution Requiring Masks in County Owned Buildings.

WHEREAS the Health and Human Services Board serves as the local board of health per s.251.04 Wis. Stats.,

WHEREAS the local board of health is responsible to assure that measures are taken to provide an environment in which individuals can be healthy, and

WHEREAS COVID-19 disease activity in Wisconsin remains at a high level. All four "variants of concern" have been identified in the state and it is likely that these strains may be contributing to the current level of disease activity as these have the potential to spread more effectively throughout populations. As of May 11, 2021, 44.5% of Wisconsin residents had received at least one dosage of COVID-19 vaccine and 37.6% had completed the series. The goal for herd immunity in Wisconsin is much greater and the current vaccination rates do not offer the level of protection that will permit state residents to return to normal activities., and

WHEREAS in Richland County, COVID-19 disease activity is considered high. The P.1 variant (a variant of concern) has been identified locally. Vaccination rates include the following: 44.2% have received one dosage of a COVID-19-containing vaccine and 39.0% have completed the series, and

WHEREAS statewide, in last two weeks, a large proportion of positive COVID-19 cases occurred in 14-17 year olds. As of May 11<sup>th</sup>, those under the age of 16 are ineligible to be vaccinated and concerns exist regarding the continued transmission of the disease in this age group, and

WHEREAS given the fact that COVID-19 disease activity remains high, variants continue to circulate, and vaccination rates have not sufficiently risen to the levels necessary to offer community-wide protection, the use of preventive measures remains a critical part of protecting our staff and those we serve. The use of face-coverings, when used correctly and consistently, have been identified as an extremely effective method for minimizing the transmission of the COVID-19 virus, and

WHEREAS the Richland County Health Officer, Ms. Rose Kohout, has recommended requiring masks in county-owned buildings to the Health and Human Services Board, and

WHEREAS the Health and Human Services Board functioning as the local board of health has carefully considered this proposal and is now presenting this Resolution to the County Board for its consideration.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Richland County Board of Supervisors that all individuals entering county-owned buildings shall be strongly recommended to wear a mask or face covering.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that Richland County employees shall be strongly recommended to wear a mask or face covering in county-owned buildings except when alone in their office, work station, or enclosed work space, and

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A Resolution Amending The Committee Structure Resolution Regarding Transition to the Administrator Model of Government.

WHEREAS the Rules and Resolutions Committee, after receiving recommendations from Administrator Transition Committee is now recommending several amendments to the Committee Structure Resolution provisions relating to the responsibilities and duties of the Finance and Personnel Committee, Law Enforcement and Judiciary Committee, Revolving Loan Committee, and Rules and Resolutions; and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Richland County Board of Supervisors that the Committee Structure Resolution are hereby amended by repealing the following crossed-out language and adopting the following underlined language:

## FINANCE AND PERSONNEL COMMITTEE

- A. Seven members. For the initial term, 3 of the members shall have a term of 1 year, 4 of the members shall have a term of 2 years. The Committee shall decide the length of each appointee's initial term. After the initial term, all terms shall be for 2 years.
- B. Selected by the Committee on Committees for appointment by the County Board except that the County Board Chair and the Vice-Chair shall be automatic members of the Committee.
- C. To supervise all financial matters of the County Board for the purpose of keeping expenditures under control and within the budget adopted by the County Board. To invest monies, and to have responsibility for financial audits by outside auditors. To provide insurance coverage for all County property and administer all property, liability and worker's compensation policies.
- D. Annually prepare a budget for the County for submission to the County Board for its approval at the annual meeting. Work with the County Administrator in the preparation of the annual county budget.
- E. The committee shall advise and supervise County administrative affairs in general with a view of bringing about proper coordination and cooperation between the various departments and agencies in the County to the end that the best business practices may be observed; that due efficiency may be maintained; and that the interests of the citizens of the County may best be served.
- F. This committee shall handle all matters relating to debt service issues.
- G. This committee shall initially consider all claims made against Richland County, except claims arising under the Dog License Law, Chapter 174, Wisconsin Statutes, and shall make a recommendation to the County Board as to how to dispose of each such claim.
- H. Assist with issues that may arise out of the offices of the County Clerk, County Treasurer and Register of Deeds.
- I. Sell all tax deed property in the manner prescribed by the Wisconsin Statutes and as deemed appropriate by the Committee and without further approval by the County Board.
- J. Administer the Revolving Loan Fund account in accordance with the procedures manual.
- K. Make fund transfers between budget lines within the budgets of individual departments or committees in the annual County budget.
- L. The County Administrator shall rRecommend to the Committee all proposals of lowering or raising the salary ranges, fixing the salaries, sick leave, vacation periods, holidays, working conditions, insurance for County employees, fringe benefits and leaves of absence shall be referred to the Personnel Committee only after consideration and recommendation by the concerned department head and

- committee. The Personnel Committee shall review and analyze such proposals and make such recommendations to the County Board as it determines appropriate.
- M. <u>The committee The County Administrator</u> shall from time to time conduct or cause to be conducted Job Analysis and Evaluations and a study of the table of operations, <u>and and report to the Committee</u>. <u>-iIf</u> a change in any of the above is recommended, <u>and-then</u> said recommendation shall be submitted to the County Board for action.
- N. The committee shall, after recommendation by the concerned department head and committee, set working conditions, grant leaves of absence, grant promotions, settle grievances, and establish personnel rules, regulations and policy.
- O. The committee together with such professional assistance as may be provided by the County Board, shall represent the County in collective bargaining and all other situations and procedures covered by section 111.70, Wisconsin Statutes, including the applications and interpretation of all collective bargaining agreements. The County Board shall have authority to approve or reject any and all agreements of any employee bargaining units.
- P. This committee shall review, examine and recommend to the County for approval the amount of bonds of various county officers and employees.
- Q. Supervise the activities, functions, duties and powers of all elected and appointed officials' departments in Richland County.
- R. Administer County's Federal and State Family and Medical Leave Act policies and forms.
- S. The Committee will administer the County's deferred compensation program.
- Maintain a written self-evaluation for approval by the County Board to ensure that the County's delivery of services and programs is in compliance with the Americans with Disabilities Act.
- U.S. Administer and review the procedure for the filing of complaints under the Americans With Disabilities Act and develop a written self-evaluation for the purpose of bringing the County's hiring and appointment procedures into compliance with the Americans With Disabilities Act.
- Y.T. The Committee shall administer the personnel aspects of Courthouse security.
- W. Study and make recommendations to the County Board regarding future telephone needs of all County departments.
- X.U. Authorize all expenditures from the Video-Conferencing Fund.

### LAW ENFORCEMENT AND JUDICIARY COMMITTEE

- A. Five members.
- B. Selected by the Committee on Committees for appointment by the County Board.
- C. To confer with and superviseProvide oversight and advice for the needs, powers and duties of the Sheriff of Richland County, his deputies and employees, and attend to the supervision of the jail.
- D. To audit all bills for expenditures within the department.
- E. To Provide oversight and advice on service and maintain maintenance of all equipment relative to the department.
- F. Present to the Board any suggestions the Committee may have concerning law enforcement and other duties required by the Sheriff's Department.
- G. Have charge Provide oversight and advice of all matters pertaining to the operation of the Police Radio System.
- H. Receive, investigate and make recommendations to the County Board as to matters relating to the administration of the court system in Richland County.

- I. This committee shall deal with matters relating to the Richland County Circuit Court, the Law Library, the Family Court Commissioner, the Register in Probate, the Clerk of Circuit Court, the District Attorney, the Corporation Counsel, the Probation and Parole Office and any other matters that may relate to the court system in Richland County.
- J. Make appropriations from the Jail Assessment Fund for construction, remodeling, repair or improvement of the County Jail, without approval from the County Board.
- K. Supervise Provide oversight and advice for the operations of the Coroner's Office.
- L. Supervise Provide oversight and advice for the security and maintenance and rental of the County's radio towers and the accompanying building and surrounding fenced grounds.

Supervise Provide oversight and advice for the operation of the County's 911 emergency telephone response system.

### REVOLVING LOAN FUND COMMITTEE

A. Seven citizen members, at least one of whom shall be a banker and at least one of whom shall be an accountant. The Committee shall consist of individuals representative of broad community interests, and having special expertise and knowledge of commercial lending and economic developments processes.

- A. Members shall be appointed by the Finance Committee.
- B. The Committee shall review, select and recommend loan applications to the Finance Committee for final approval. The Committee shall also make policy recommendations to the Finance Committee for the administration of the Richland County Revolving Loan Program.
- C. Three members shall constitute a quorum of the Committee.
- D. Perform the duties set forth in the Richland County Revolving Loan Fund Manual dated July, 1998.
- E. This Committee is not subject to the 6 years of continuous service rule.

Resolution in Support of Increased County Child Support Funding

WHEREAS Richland County administers the Child Support Enforcement Program on behalf of the state, providing services to 756 cases in RICHLAND COUNTY including paternity establishment, obtaining child support and health insurance orders for children, and enforcing and modifying those orders; and

WHEREAS Our children's well-being, economic security and success in life are enhanced by parents who provide financial and emotional support; and

WHEREAS county child support agencies collected \$935 Million in child support during 2019 and established 98,405 health insurance orders for Wisconsin children; and

WHEREAS Richland County's Child Support Agency provides services to children as well as custodial and non-custodial parents that reduce childhood poverty rates, establish parental rights and promote the involvement of both parents in the lives of their children; and

WHEREAS the economic security and social service programs provided by RICHLAND COUNTY Child Support Agency are needed by Wisconsin children and families now more than ever due to the economic downturn caused by COVID-19; and

WHEREAS state funding for county child support services has failed to keep up with county agency costs, which have steadily increased due to growing caseloads, inflation and new federal regulations; and

WHEREAS Wisconsin's Child Support Enforcement Program has fallen from 2<sup>nd</sup> in the nation for collecting current support to 5th; and

WHEREAS Wisconsin's decreased performance has led to the state losing out on an estimated \$70,000 in potential federal incentive payments between Calendar Year 2019 and 2020; and

WHEREAS an abrupt federal interpretation changes in June 2019 eliminated \$4.2 million in federal birth cost recovery matching funds for Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS Wisconsin's strong performance in child support is at risk without additional state funding. Further drops in performance would result in additional reductions to federal funding for Wisconsin; and

WHEREAS decreased federal funding results in less funding for RICHLAND COUNTY's child support agency. This could lead to reductions in child support enforcement staff and services and reduced child support collections; and

WHEREAS new state investments in child support are amplified by a generous federal match. Every \$1 of state GPR invested in the Child Support Program generates roughly \$2 in federal matching funds; and

WHEREAS Wisconsin's Child Support Enforcement Program is incredibly cost-effective, collecting an average of \$6.20 in support for every dollar invested in the program.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Richland County Board of Supervisors respectfully requests that state funding for county child support agencies be increased by \$4 million GPR in each fiscal year of the 2021-23 Wisconsin state budget, which will generate approximately \$7.7 million in additional federal funding each year. This investment will ensure that Wisconsin counties can continue to effectively provide economic support to our children.

IT IS FURTHER RESOLVED that a copy of this resolution be forwarded by the County Clerk to the Governor of the State of Wisconsin, State Senators and State Representatives representing Richland County, the Secretary of the Wisconsin Department of Administration, and the Wisconsin Counties Association for consideration.
